Lorraine and her executive team being Maurie Harper Vice President, Kellie Mortimore Secretary and Margaret Butler Treasurer, have left no stone unturned to improve the Society's profile and its efforts and they deserve much praise. Support members have also been there to fill their roles in many capacities.

With the exception of the treasurer, positions remain largely unchanged with Margaret Butler relinquishing this role after sixteen years of dedicated service. Office bearers and other positions are – President L.Lethlean, Vice President M.Harper, Secretary K.Mortimore, Treasurer R.Cole, Reporters L.Lethlean and R.Hickey, Machinery Guides and Curators C.Bray and I.Forbes, Museum Guides and Curators All Members.

It is great to see the Old Church looking so smart and if you have not driven past at night please take a detour and do so as the lighting really enhances the building. We hope that in the near future exhibits will be replaced and we can again open the building to the public. The centenary of local govt is fast approaching (1924) and we will work with the shire on this. The President congratulated the Town Team on its work in the town and on receiving the Australia Day award.

A request for help in locating the family farm of Jack and Mary Wilkinson was made by their daughter. The family farmed in the district between the 2 World Wars. Their daughter who is almost 90 years of age is Beatrice and lives in Perth and her sister Olive is recently deceased. From checking the old rate books we have ascertained that the farm is in the Mt Walker area. If anyone has any recollections please contact Rhonda Hickey 0428132454.

K.Mortimore has researched the type of Baker's cart on display and will add the notes for visitors to read in conjunction with the display. Dick Wigg (former resident) sent a poem which was read and which will appear in the Fencepost. We are looking forward to working with the school again this year commencing early in Term 2 with Mrs Lucy Lines and her Year 1 Class. Gary Mentiplay has written requesting information and photos of any English automotive dealership buildings in Narembeen. Donations were received from Paul Hudnott – CD of his songs about Narembeen's early settlers, Narembeen District High School – Slide Rule, and a book "The Flying Needle" on the work of Rusty Walkley and her embroidery. The President thanked the Mens Shed for restoring a seat now located at the Old Church. The meeting closed at 3pm with an invitation to attend our next meeting on March 20th at the History Centre at 2pm.

As is usual following the meeting afternoon tea is enjoyed so as the essentials were being set up there was a sudden influx of visitors, mostly members of the Hickey and Butler families. To the great surprise (maybe even shock) of Rhonda and Margaret they were recipients of Life Member awards. President Lorraine presented the awards after reading of the contributions made over the years. Rhonda and Margaret were then presented with framed citations and engraved medals. They both sincerely thank the Society for this honour and for all the research which was required to make it a reality.

NAREMBEEN HISTORICAL SOCIETY LIFE MEMBERSHIP Margaret BUTLER 20th February 2023

Although our records are not complete from 1985 to 2002, the first we see of Margaret is coming in as Assistant Secretary in February 2003 and continuing this role until 2007 when she was elected Treasurer and has been ever since with a stint of Secretary/Treasurer for 2011 and 2012. Other positions that Margaret filled are Curator to the museums, committee member and most important – photographer. Margaret has the knack of taking photographs of everyday things and making them look stunning.

Margaret is a very valuable and active member of the Society with her unassuming quiet manner she gets things done and has a lot to offer. The roster system was drawn up in 2004 for the opening of the museums and although not many visitors came through it was an opportunity for the members to organise and file information. In 2007 the stall was manned by Margaret with other members. Several outings have been attended and the photographs have been good reminders of where these events have been.



Margaret attended the inaugural meeting for the Centenary Celebrations and gave valuable input as to the Historical Society requirements.

Funding was obtained and computer equipment was purchased and Margaret became the Historical Societies' computer guru, printing off photographs, recording items and being the "one" to go to for information.

Together with Rhonda, Margaret did a lot of leg work in the erection of the signage at South Kumminin and Billericay. This included the co-opting of her son, Brad and for his help we are forever grateful. It is not always easy to ask your family to assist with your volunteer tasks.

When you look around our museums, the display cabinets have all been sourced by Margaret. This is no easy task, getting them to match each other and decide on the size etc. It becomes a big job. After the refurbishment of the History Centre the old chairs needed to be replaced, this task fell to Margaret also. Not easy to source chairs that are suitable for old people without being very heavy. She did it though.

Several raffles have been organised by Margaret to help raise funds for the society being Treasurer she is on the ball with our up to date financial situation.

Having such a wonderful garden it is hard to imagine that she is always available to show people through our museums and this is quite time consuming. Together with going to courses in other towns, a lot of time is given to the Society in the past few years which would not have been easy to give especially with an ill husband to care for.

Our records (not complete) show that Margaret attended 151 meetings and presented her Treasurers report at every meeting that she has been Treasurer.

A dedicated member indeed and Life Membership to the Historical Society seems a fitting reward for such dedication to the Society.

NAREMBEEN HISTORICAL SOCIETY LIFE MEMBERSHIP RHONDA HICKEY 20TH FEBRUARY 2023

The first record that we have of Rhonda attending a meeting of the Narembeen Historical Society was in October 1978. There are a few records missing from 1976 and 1977 though. Also records from 1986-2002 seem to have gone astray. In February 2003, Rhonda was elected President and has held several offices since then. Secretary, Reporter, Publicity Officer, Curator, Assistant Secretary and Assistant Publicity Officer and with the records we have, 184 meetings have been attended by her.

Rhonda has been a very valuable and active member of the Society. Although not being born in Narembeen she became involved through her late husband Patrick and has a wealth of knowledge about the district.

There have been many a mallee root raffle organised by Rhonda with the "stumps" donated and collected from their farm.

Several pieces of machinery have come from the Hickey farm for display in our museum together with household items and other memorabilia.

With the gun laws being changed, the collection of firearms at the museum and in the area had to be logged and handed in. Rhonda was able to deal with this efficiently.



Several trips to other museums and towns were organised by Rhonda also being a delightful day out for all our members and giving them an insight as to how other Historical Societies manage.

The job list goes on and on, gardening, standing in for people to take minutes, attending seminars for grant funding, filling in as a Publicity Officer, manning stalls during town events, helping with the Old Church refurbishment in 1997, labelling the vestments, helping with the establishment of the War Museum at the Spotters Hut. Not to mention the hours of cleaning and filing that has been done.

All these things are extra to the continual supply of visitors that we have through the town who need to be shown through our Museums and Rhonda seems to always be available. It does take up a lot of your time taking the visitors around.

Being an ex-school teacher Rhonda is quite often called on to take groups of school children through the museums and explain to them the workings of our "old" kitchen items. The children seem to enjoy this as much as Rhonda does. There are some of the teachers that come with the children who do not know what the items are used for so it is informative for them also.

Perhaps the biggest job was collating together, proof reading, liaising with the publisher, and doing the leg work with the stories for the book, Narembeen the First 100 Years. That was a mammoth task and appreciated by all who have purchased the book and returned to Narembeen for the 100 Year celebrations of settlement.

More recently was the involvement in erecting the information bay at South Kumminin and Billericay. It is not just a task of erecting a "Booth" as some people are apt to think. Planning permission has to be obtained, the information needs to be correct and the photograph selection was a task on its own.

Rhonda has carried out these tasks and many more while bringing up two boys (who have contributed a lot also), nursing her late husband while he was ill and successfully organising their own Family 100 years of Farming Event.

Life Membership to the Historical Society seems a miniscule reward for such a Lifetime of work given to the Society.




BOWLS NEWS

Community Health matters - Workplace Health and Safety matters too

Many employers and employees in rural communities throughout Western Australia are bemused, confused and even dismissive of strengthened workplace health and safety legislation rolled out last year. However, organizational integration and compliance with the *Work Health and Safety Act (2020) and Regulations (2022)* by organisations, employers and employees may define whether or not an unfortunate accident results in a criminal proceeding arising from breaches to regulations now enshrined in law.

The new rules apply to public and private organisations and enterprises including voluntary and not for profit entities. The changes to workplace legislation respond to unacceptable levels of preventable workplace death and injury by formulating a more integrated and systematic approach to work health and safety. Industries experiencing high rates of serious injury and death include farming and agriculture, mining and construction.

Unsafe work practices and environments create an unsafe culture in the workplace. It follows however that cultures within communities also create unsafe workplaces because people bring their long-held values and social norms to their work environment.

The traditional approach to occupational health and safety requires adaptation of worker behaviour to the workplace, placing responsibility for safety on the employee. The modern approach focuses on 'safe place' by encouraging development of supportive safety culture. It means employers must take reasonably practical steps to manage hazardous environments to make workplaces safer.

Key features of the WHS Act include:

changes to terminology e.g., occupational health and safety becomes work health and safety clarification of the term 'health' to include physical and psychological wellbeing

broader definition of who is a 'worker'

broader definition of a 'workplace'

broadening of persons with health and safety duties and obligations

broadening of 'primary duty of care'

requirement for 'due diligence'

requirements for all duty holders to consult with others

consultation mechanisms for various roles and functions

a positive duty (proactive safety activities) for 'officers' (e.g., company directors)

focus on elimination risk and minimisation/mitigation where elimination is not possible

enforcement measures to ensure compliance and rectification where a breach of legislation occurs

The WHS Act is supported by three sets of Regulations

Work Health and Safety (General) Regulations 2022 – applies to all workplaces except those covered by the other two set of regulations

Work Health and Safety (Mines) Regulations 2022

Work Health and Safety (Petroleum and Geothermal Energy Operations) Regulations 2022

Development of a safe system approach to occupational health and safety recognises that accidents and incidents are the result of a series of contributing factors and events. It focusses on identification of 'root causes' to incidents and prevention of system errors that may result in injury.

Systemized risk management identifies and describes hazards, the situations or things with potential to harm a person, and risks, or possibility of harm to persons exposed to those hazards. Organizations have an obligation to implement risk management processes in order to comply with their primary duty of care under the WHS Act and their responsibility to exercise due diligence. Primary duty of care extends to all workers, engaged or caused to be engaged and ensuring work activities do not pose any risks to health and safety of others. Workers include volunteers. Visitors to a workplace are captured within the definitions.

Socio-cultural factors explain the reluctance in rural communities to address the underlying conditions that not only influence elevated levels of workplace death and injury but also suicide, domestic violence and poor mental health outcomes in rural and regional Australia.

The addition of a new category of hazard – *Psychosocial Hazards*, recognises the role socio-cultural influences play in development of 'safe place' culture. Unlike physical hazards, psychosocial hazards are considered individual hazards and my affect one person but not another, making them challenging to assess and control. Psychosocial hazards are stressors that may affect individuals in different ways. The following conditions have been identified as contributing to psychosocial hazards:

pressures of work targets unattainable work loads insufficient training for task working environment personality clashes fatigue boring/repetitive tasks financial concerns social concerns bullying, harassment noise, remoteness, temperature aggression, violence relationship issues discrimination trauma low self-esteem

Building 'safe place' culture and thinking into rural communities is a step towards healthier communities where 'root causes' of risks to health and safety are identified and mitigation strategies implemented for the benefit of all. The whole community loses if risk management process is considered socially unacceptable and workers who promote improved workplace health and safety are regarded as a threat or 'dobbers'.

'Sounds Like' it's time to quit smoking

On Sunday 12 February 2023, Cancer Council WA's Make Smoking History Program launched a new WA-made campaign, <u>Sounds Like</u>, which asks people to listen to their bodies for the sounds and signs to quit smoking.

If you smoke, you will be all too familiar with the health impacts in the advertisements, which range from smoker's cough to bleeding gums. These common concerns may lead to life-long consequences, like severe breathlessness or loss of teeth.

The good news is, as soon as you quit smoking, your body starts to repair itself. Becoming a non-smoker is the single most important thing you can do for your health.
