Melvin BRISTOW

(3.10.1925 - 22.8.2023)

Eulogy from the family

Melvin, Mel, Dad, Pa or however you knew him, was a loving man with a cheeky sense of humour.

Born nearly 98 years ago in Bruce Rock Hospital, the son of Frank (Pop) and Alice Bristow, who came over from South Australia several years earlier, he was their second child, Jean being four years older.

Mel grew up on the family farm in Narembeen. His was a happy childhood except for the sadness of his mother dying when he was 12 years old. He'd originally attended Emu Hill School, by horse and buggy with Jean, but when she left for St Hilda's he rode his bike. With the introduction of a school bus to the Narembeen school, Emu Hill closed.

Mel was a good scholar and an outstanding sportsman. His athletic prowess had been noted. Thanks to Iris, while Janine and Coralie were researching in the History Centre, they came across several articles from the *Corrigin - Bruce Rock Post* from 1940, about Melvin being the open boys' champion in consecutive years at Narembeen and later at Muresk, when he was both junior and open champion in the same year.

The Post reported:

"This lad is a grand athlete and from close observation throughout the day it became apparent that he is not only this year's champion, but above all, a true sport in every sense of the word, one who has been taught to play the game and play it modestly and to the very best of his ability".

This WAS how Mel lived his life, trying his very best in all he did, never broadcasting nor big noting himself.

He went to Muresk Agricultural College in 1941 until mid 1942 when the army took over the college for an army camp and he was manpowered back on the farm to support the war effort.

Mel and Iris met on the bus coming back from a sports day in Kondinin, Mel having been champion of the day. He used his winnings to shout everyone a drink and got on the bus in high spirits. Only one seat was vacant, next to Iris at the back. The rest, as they say, is history. Courting originally meant a 16 km bike ride, uphill and on a dirt road to visit Iris. It would be 5 years before marriage, Iris having to work off her teaching bond at the Narembeen school.

They went on to have 3 children, Kingsley, Janine and Coralie, 8 grandchildren and 18 great grandchildren and were only 2 weeks short of reaching their 76th wedding anniversary. Iris was the love of Mel's life and was always highly protective of her. They both buoyed and supported each other's community interests. In his last days, despite having been heavily medicated, he surprised us all when he reached out for a hug as Iris got up to go to lunch.

Generally, it wasn't beyond Mel at Lakeside to feign a 'deadpan' face, frightening nurse after nurse of his demise, as he brazenly repeated his antics.

His firm handshake had often turned into a competition as to who was strongest. And battling Alan Bow was one of his last daily rituals.

Mel was an accomplished sportsman as already mentioned; he cycled, played basketball, tennis, golf and lawn bowls and also captained Warriors football team to a premiership. Not only did he enjoy playing sport, but held various office positions.

Both Mel and Iris were life members of the bowls club and won numerous championships. Early on, Mel had helped establish the original bowling greens, while still sticking to tennis. However, encouraged by his in laws, Hilda and Baden Moppett, he and Iris played in the pairs championship and promptly beat them. Baden and Hilda were none too happy!

Greenkeeper, Alan Bow and Mel went on to form a close working relationship determining weed control and chemical use on the greens, to undoubtedly produce the best rinks in the association. Showing his sense of humour, Mel one day cheekily put silastic in Bernie Cusack's Grippo tube. To his credit, Bernie battled on all day with a 'sticky' bowl without comment. Probably working out ways to get his own back.

Being a considerate and sociable person, Mel became significantly involved in the Narembeen community. Appointed as a Justice of the Peace in 1979, he served 34 years. We know of at least one lad who was helped back onto the straight and narrow after appearing before him in court.

Elected as a shire councillor for 18 years, 4 of those as shire president, the original recreation centre with the squash courts was built during this era. As president of the Great Eastern Ward, Mel and CEO Jim Epiro covered many miles and meetings together. It has been said he ran a good meeting, retaining a decent balance of business and humour.

For his achievements Mel was made an Honorary Freeman of the Shire in 2011.

Likewise, he was awarded Narembeen Citizen of the Year, also in 2011, with additional notable achievements over the years as having:

Served both as president of the Homes for the Aged when Koolberrin was built (and where Mel resided for a short time 34 years later), and for the Hospital Board.

Been a foundation member and office bearer of the Historical Society from its inception in 1964, again both Mel and Iris being made life members.

Spent many hours in the air as president of the Aero Club, many years as Chief Fire Control Officer and member of the local Fire Brigade. Travelled around the wheatbelt when he accepted a job of hail and fire insurance assessing.

Kingsley followed Frank (Pop) and Mel into the Masonic Lodge making three generations of the same family. Mel was a member for over 70 years and all received Grand Lodge Honours.

As a farmer and, questionably, where did he find the time? Mel was closely supported firstly by his father Frank and later son Kingsley and grandson Jeremy, whom he held a close bond. Moreover, Mel was a progressive and forward thinker, frequently testing new seed varieties and chemicals before most others. A particular field day even drew Eastern States' farmers over to Narembeen to see what we were doing in the West.

Mel was also innovative, constructing and welding his own tractor cab and wheat bin in the 50s plus other farm implements. (So innovative, that decades later a pair of multigrip pliers were to replace a worn-out handle on Iris's recliner chair at Dale Cresent. Perfect.)

He loved his cattle too, building up a stud, then running a very successful feedlot.

There was never a dull moment on the farm. Mel was always the joker. When poor Lindsey Greenwood was purposely given the 'hurry up', he'd grab his hat to go, only to find it nailed to the bench. That wasn't the only time.

When MeI and Iris moved into town, the garden with shrubs, colourful annuals, vegie patch and particularly the orange tree gave him huge pleasure, as did in later years just standing with a hose watering, well, maybe not so much the water bills. The back table was constantly full of gadgets to repair, paint or abandon.

Mel spent many weekends with Terry Nichols trawling the countryside for vintage machinery for the farm machinery museum and thereafter working with Kent Norman restoring pieces.

More recently though, alongside Norm Pascoe and Alan Sedgewick whilst involved with the Men's Shed.

Jack Russells were his lovable companions ... especially Pacca and Molly, the latter being number 10. All of them may have been of healthier stock had they not been continually fed titbits under the table. Molly was visiting Mel at Lakeside up until a week before he died, and our sincere thanks to Norm Pascoe for caring for her and bringing her into town for weekly visits, with the help of Chris Bray.

Eileen and Kingsley remember getting home from Perth one day catching Mel walking around in his undies with the rest of his clothes on the fence. He had thrown Billy in the house dam to cool off, but Billy couldn't swim. So, to the rescue Mel went.

After leaving the farm, volunteering at Wadderin Wild Life Sanctuary filled a hugely satisfying gap in his life. He and Brian Price as inaugural voluntary wardens, loved nothing better than doing the rounds of the fencing on their quad bikes looking for holes made by kangaroos or echidnas. We've had to thank Brian Cusack more than once for rescuing them when they've misjudged the narrow wooden plank crossing, and ended up with the wheels in the gutter. We also reckon there are a few animals out there with very good hearing too, the number of times Mel took off his jumper as well as a hearing aid.

Over the years, Iris and Mel travelled widely, both within Australia mainly caravanning and extensively overseas. No matter where they went, they always made lasting friendships. However, each time Mel got home, the family recalls how he quietly protested about having had to get up an hour earlier than everyone else just to account for all the luggage.

As a father, Mel was a big hugger, a little softer on discipline, but he had his moments, reminding us of the strap hanging behind the kitchen door.

He loved all foods, but his favourites were a constant ... slabs of rocky road from Hills' South Kumminin Store, hunks of cheese, multiple scoops of ice cream, condensed milk from the fridge by the spoonful and last, but not least the delectable parson's nose. We kids definitely fought over the first four.

As a grandfather and great grandfather, Mel was a loveable rogue, often getting the youngsters into trouble with their parents. Ultimately, it's doubtful if they knew right from wrong.

It is true to say, Melvin's life was a life well lived, and he was a man well loved. We can sit back and reflect, "How on earth did he fit it all in, in his 98 years?"

The presence of your love was always wrapped up with your hugs.

<u> 100 years Narembeen School – by Hazel Toovey</u>

1934. My first day at school. Aged six years. What a time to start. It was the middle of a world-wide Depression.

The world was in "chaos", very little money, jobs or food. Plenty of kangaroo, rabbit and eggs. All families had chooks. Farmers gone broke and walking off farms and threat of a World War. The 1920s Boom time had gone.

We kids weren't too concerned, we had a 2-teacher school room on Northmore Road. Headmaster and Lady teacher shared school room. Always called Lady teacher. The school was the only building on the block, plus old-fashioned toilet. The school was made of weatherboard with iron roof. Inside, big blackboards, desks, chairs, open fireplace. All pencils, pens, paper, etc. supplied by school, and chalk for blackboards. Some teachers were good shots at kids being naughty (these days called child abuse).

Outside a tank on stand. No running water in 1934. Water was carted from standpipe to fill tank – water from Wadderin Dam.

The school format, the same as today, 4 terms, 5 days. Holidays and special days. Play time – we went home for lunch – all to be back on time or trouble. Miss Pauline Parker came 1936. A handheld bell was rung to start school. Kids line up. Headmaster spoke of days subjects, activities or news, etc. Lady teacher inspected hands. Face had all to be clean and tidy – no uniforms. Boys and girls all to wear shoes or sand shoes, socks pulled up (no exceptions). Approx 36 town kids. Boys wore shorts all year, no long pants then all march into school. Headmaster standard 6-10. Lady 1-5. Headmaster's word absolute law – no back chat or trouble, meaning no play time or sport.

Early learning seemed repetitious. ABC, counting etc. almost chanting – then new subject one day then repeat. 6-10 very different. All kids had small brown case for personal things and a sandwich. All had to eat at play time or too hungry. Bread cost 3 pennies a loaf.

We were learning a lot more with Miss Parker. Great teacher. No organized sport – not enough kids. Boys played marbles, kicked footy, running, high jumps. Girls – skipping, drop the hankie (a game), running, etc. – we all learnt tennis.

All stayed this way until 1939.

The small schools closed.


School buses came with gas producers on, 2 more schools. New building and Old Emu School. Lots more kids, big school now. "One" more teacher: now (3) and war broke out. Big school – so organised sport with Bruce Rock, South Kumminin and other schools. 1940. Another very good teacher. Mr Cawley. Learnt a lot more. Japan came into the war so air raid drill, as Japs planes came over some country areas.

1942. 60 evacuees and carers came by train from Perth all lived in big boarding house on main street. No room at our schools, so used Masonic Lodge and old hall. 2 more teachers. These kids had no ideas about a bush school. They learnt lots of things good and bad – made new friends.

The two teachers who made a big difference to our education were Pauline Parker who became Mrs Burgin and Mr Cawley.

I left school in 1943 with my Junior Certificate and went to work.






