Eulogy by Jeremy Brístow

22.9.2023

Good morning everyone.

Thank you for attending this service for Pa today.



I'm here to represent the grandchildren and great grandchildren, of who Pa loved us all.

A couple of days before his passing, my family and I made a dash up from Albany to see Pa, and as I walked into his room, I heard one of my aunties say, "It's alright Pa your favourite grandson is here."

I didn't see myself as the favourite, but as the luckiest one of all, as I have had the privilege to spend most of my life, every day with Pa.

It is the best thing about being on the family farm and having multiple generations still alive, and with the arrival of my daughter Asha we had four generations on the farm. This is the second time we have been lucky enough for this to happen, as we had this the first time around when old Pop was alive. I am so very grateful for my children to be able to know Pa for so long, and hopefully to have Gran for many more years.

In my younger years, growing up, I was like an appendage to Pa. We went everywhere on the farm, ram sales, Dowerin Field days and most of all visiting Pop Bristow. It was a weekly trip into town to mow Pop's lawns, check the bushes in the front yard to see what was nesting in them (mainly doves as they were Pop's favourite), and a walk down to the block behind the old bowling green to check the vegie garden and Pop's famous Sturt Desert Peas. Pa and Pop were very close after Pa losing his mum at a young age. This is a big part of why Pa loved having family around him.

As I grew older, the training began for me to be a farmer. I remember we were moving cows into the cattle yards behind the super shed, this was my first driving lesson. I was about seven at the time and could just see over the dashboard, I was Pa's 'Jiminy Cricket'. "Well, Jiminy Cricket, it's time to learn how to drive, I will get you going and jump out and you steer behind the mob while I get out and chase them." Well, things were going really well until we got to the yards and the end of the road. I didn't know how to stop the ute so just ran it into the loading ramp at the yards. I can still remember Pa coming over and saying, "Well Jiminy Cricket, I guess I didn't plan that out very well!"

I remember too, always sitting on Pa's lap steering the header during harvest. One day when I was about nine he decided he needed a smoke so sat me on the seat and said, "Just keep going around, I will just sit on the step and have a smoke," so off I go steering the header and then I looked over and he had bailed off and was wandering around the paddock. I came around on the next lap and he held out his thumb to hitch a ride, jumped back on and we kept going.

Pa was always full of cheek and practical jokes, usually at the expense of myself, or the workman, so I apologise to all the workman we had but the one that copped it most of all was Mr Greenwood, especially for all the times he had his hat nailed to the bench, snuck up behind and had the hairs on the back of his legs pulled or the odd egg lobbed in his direction.

Morning tea was another of Pa's favourites, he loved Mum's chocolate cake. She used to make one that was meant to last the week, so we were only allowed one row a day, but by the time Dad and I got there, Pa had already polished off a row and Dad and I would have to start another one and poor Mum had to make another cake. When I was younger,

I would get off the school bus and the first thing I would do was run over the shed to see what Pa was up to with a slab of chocolate cake in my hand. Pa would always get me doing something to distract me from my cake and I would turn around to see him eating half and the dog getting the other half. It took me a long time to cotton onto this trick.

The other one he used to get me with, was when I would ask him what he was fixing, and his answer would be, "Making a wigwam for a goose's bridle!" Well, we had geese at this stage and it baffled me how he would make it fit, and again it took me a while to work out he was having a lend of me.

One of my other favourite memories was that Pa always had a chocolate hidden at the bottom of his lunch box, I thought I had done well for a lot of years managing to steal that chocolate out of his lunch box until I found out that Gran always used to pack him two, one he ate on the way out to the farm and the one for me to steal.

Another big passion that Pa fell in love with was his Jack Russells. The first Jack Russell we had inherited was from 'Aunty' Kev and Aunty Winnie while they were doing renovations in Perth. The idea was for the dog to go back, but there was no way that Pa was going to let Bobby go home. Pacca was the first one that was Pa's and Pa's only. It was at this stage that we were pretty sure after all those years that Gran had started to play second fiddle to the dog. Pacca was a bugger of a dog, and couldn't resist the smell of a mouse, and in his eternal hunt for them ate through half the electrical appliances in the house at Dale Crescent, including the stereo multiple times. Pa was always coming out to the workshop with items in tow to rewire due to the talents of one little dog.

Not long after this, my daughter Asha came a long, and giving Pa babysitting duties was a good way of keeping him occupied. One day we needed to move a mob of sheep, so Dad and I legged it and we got Pa in the ute with Asha strapped happily in her car seat in the back. We had been going for a while and Dad and I were running around and Pa was nowhere to be seen. When he finally caught up, we asked him what he had been doing. His explanation was that Asha kept pulling her socks off and throwing them out the window so he had to keep stopping and picking them up. When I told him to either wind the window up or take the kid's socks off her, he just smiled and replied, "There's no fun in that!"

The last big position for Pa was at the Wadderin Reserve where Pa and his best mate Pricey would spend countless hours on fence duty and vermin control. Echidnas were his nemesis for the fences and cats for the future of the animals he was trying to protect. Right now, I will apologise to Kellie Mortimore if she ever had any cats go missing unexpectedly, it was because it was Pa's highlight of his cat tracking activities at the reserve to catch an intruder.

In finishing, I would just like to say from all the grandkids and great grandkids who got to spend time with you, that we will all miss you greatly and will continue to look after Gran for you.

So here are some chocolates that I owe you for all the ones I stole, a block of Coon cheese because you loved a slab of cheese and were so cranky when they changed the name to Cheers, and a handful of quandongs for all the times we went picking quandongs for Gran to make into pies for us.



I love you Pa and will miss you always, 'Jiminy Cricket'



Today I will do my best.

If I have a good day, I will be proud of myself.

If I have a bad day, I will not dwell on it, I will forgive myself, I will put it behind me and I will continue to Move Forward.

Those moments might be the laughter of the crowd, the volume of the applause, whether the crowd gives a standing ovation or just the air of the guests. Whatever they are, they are times when the crowd settles and sits up eager about what's going to happen next. On Friday, in front of a huge crowd on what turned about to be a beautiful day, that moment was when Plugger Welsh chirped up from the crowd at the MC Chris Arnold about something. I can't even remember what it was, but it was the moment. The moment when the Narembeen crowd settled in, for they then knew it was going to be a very Narembeen show.

The Narembeen District High School Centenary Celebrations were full of moments like this. After some formal welcomes and reflections from current principal Chris Arnold and current School Board Chair Nat Browning we heard from Hazel Toovey. Mrs Toovey, who is well into her nineties, told us stories of a school with no running water, that had Japanese planes flying over head and had to practise air raid drills through the war.

After Mrs Toovey we heard from Mrs Sylvia Yandle. Sylvie told us of strangely stored milk, skipping races and curious pairings in class plays. Former teachers Hillary Sedgwick and Dannielle Leaske-Copeman took the stage with stories of teaching at a school which always had a level of pride that set it apart even though Hil recognised the first textbooks she taught with from the time she was a student.

The speakers finished with ex-student Jordan Sprigg and current school captain Zack Garlick. The ever-eloquent Sprigg spoke of the lifelong friendships he made at Narembeen, even though he saw the beginning of some as being perhaps stone aged. Garlick gave a speech of such eloquence and though that he grew as a leader, and a person, in front of our very eyes.

After the formalities finished with a rousing rendition of a song designed just for the event from the current students the crowd moved on. They moved on to wandering the school remembering their own time. Moved on to catching up with people they hadn't seen for years or perhaps decades. They moved on to remembering what the old lunchroom was used for on weekends and how easy it was to break into the English room when the opportunity presented. It was the most Narembeen of shows.

As so often happens with a Narembeen crowd, the 4pm reminder bell and 4:30pm final shuttle bus wasn't enough to get the crowd to leave the scene, with more than a few still remembering and wandering after the last call. The sundowner that night was so well attended many didn't want it to end. The stories of a time well spent continued and the slideshow in the club was eagerly observed. For it was the most Narembeen of shows.

There are moments. Moments in all our lives where we realise that things are going to go well. Moments when we realise how lucky we are to have been part of something special. Moments when you just have a very very good time. The Narembeen District High School Centenary Celebration was one such moment. Thank you all for coming, everyone involved hopes you enjoyed it. ### Good afternoon

My name is Sylvia Yandle nee Lethlean and I started Grade one at Narembeen school in 1959 finishing Third Year high school in 1968. Of the 100 years being celebrated today, there has been a family member attending Narembeen School in 9 decades of those years, in 1923 mum's sister (Hazel Hilton) was one of the initial enrolments and now 2023 my grandson Blair is in pre-primary being the only 4<sup>th</sup> generation from a 1923 family currently at the school.

During my time at school numbers ranged from 220 to just over 300. In my year One class there were 36 students, which remained fairly steady for my seven years in primary school. When I look back over the years, it has never ceased to amaze me the number of staff to student ratio and how the teachers may have coped. For instance in 1951 there were 3 teachers for 148 students, an average over 40 with at least 2 or 3 levels in each class in comparison to 1998 where ther were 18 teachers for 200 students. I recently had a conversation with Miss Oates who came to Narembeen in 1962 to teach grade one, she had been informed there would probably be about 30-40 students in the class, however the number crept up to 50 in the first week. Numbers for grade one over her three years remained over 40, some students I believe testing her to the limits.

Majority of you (in my era) will remember being taught in the brick room at the southern end of the school more commonly known as grade one room, other buildings had been relocated (one still remaining to the west) and in 1954 the pre-fab was built, however due to insufficient space the masonic lodge was used for a number of years. Then in 1961 3 new classrooms were built, along with a Headmaster's office, staff dining room and cloakrooms with what was known as a breeze way between the new buildings and pre fab. It was a definite no no for any student to use the breezeway, I'm not sure the reason why but it was certainly feared to even think about going thru the breezeway.

Narembeen became a Junior High School in 1963 with numbers reaching 282 that year. Post primary students previously had to travel to Bruce Rock for home economics and manual arts, plus undertook other subjects via correspondence in late 50's early 60's which enabled them to complete 10years of schooling at Narembeen. The manual arts and home science rooms were built in 1964 and the roles were reversed with teachers travelling from Bruce Rock to teach these subjects at Narem.

Teachers come and go but I am sure many of you have a story to tell of Mrs Burgin, a very good but tough teacher. It would be interesting to know how many wooden rulers may have been broken across the back of students legs over the years (majority of the time deservedly), mind you I am aware of others teachers throwing a duster from the front blackboard to students at the back of the classroom for misbehaviour. The cane was also dished out over the years and I am sure some even endured more pain once dad found out when he arrived home from work.

Teaching methods have certainly changed but I still have vivid memories of actual learning that I quite often refer to today such as — "fairy e on the end changes a into A", "drop the e and add ing", "I before E except after C", "the 100 demons", and with mathematics "borrow and payback"

A number of times over the years, the winter rain prevented the buses from running therefore bus kids did not have to attend school, as a townie I still had to attend, this was deemed unfair but no amount of protesting with parents or teachers could change this ruling.

At least when the buses weren't running farming families didn't have the centre eaten out of their loaves of bread, sometimes it wasn't their own family loaf but someone else on the same bus route. I doubt if the culprits would've downed the bottled milk when they arrived at school after the crates had been sitting in the sun for a couple of hours. The milk was welcomed most of the time but unfortunately the sour milk saga outweighed this practice continuing.

Athletics played a big part in everyday school life – my first recollection is of faction sports, first with 3 factions, red/white and blue, then four red/blue/green/gold, competing against Mt Walker students, then to next level at the BRISSA carnival. Some events have ceased eg skipping, high jump, hop step and jump plus others as they were deemed to be unsafe. I was probably least co-ordinated in my family but never suffered a broken leg from a skipping race, probably because I'd still be bringing up the rear trying to sort out the rope. In later years with the closure of smaller schools we competed against Corrigin/Bruce Rock and Kulin Junior High Schools as is the case today.

The playground landscape has definitely changed – no more do you see children playing around the maypole, on the old steel monkey bars, hip or brandy, jumping/twisting/turning with French skipping, knuckle bones, marbles – competing against your best mate trying to win their prized doog, or even going down the salt lake at recess or lunch time to build a cubby its more likely you will see structured games or a screen of some sort on their lap. But that's life 100 years on.

A little trivia in closing – I was fortunate to have Mr Seinor as a teacher for 3 years, for our year 6 concert he cast Alan and I as father and mother Christmas, was it an omen 60 years ago that we would end up together.

What a fun day Kerry, Wendy and Marilyn had with this wonderful group of people.


So glad we opened on a Public holiday.

### **Bushfire Information**

SHIRE OF NAREMBEEN BUSHFIRE NOTICE - 2023/2024 SEASON
Bush Fires Act 1954

## Notice to all owners and/or occupiers of land situated within Shire of Narembeen

As a measure to assist in the control of bush fires, or preventing the spread or extension of a bush fire which may occur, notice is hereby given to all owners and/or occupiers of land within the Shire of Narembeen that pursuant to the powers conferred in Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act, works in accordance with the requisitions of this notice must be carried out before the 1st day of November in each year, or within 14 days of becoming the owner or occupier of land if after that date. All work specified in this Notice is to be maintained up to and including the 30th day of April in the following calendar year.

### **Definitions**

"Townsite Land" means all land within the boundary of the Narembeen Townsite.

"Rural Land" means all land within the Narembeen District not defined as Townsite.

"Firebreak Period" means that time between the 1st day of November in any year until the 30th day of April in the year following.

"Firebreak" means ground from which flammable material has been removed and on which no flammable materials is permitted during the firebreak period.

"Inflammable Material" means bush (as defined in the Bush Fires Act 1954), timber, boxes, carton, paper, and the like inflammable materials, rubbish, and any combustible matter, but does not include buildings, green standing trees and bushes or growing bushes or plants in gardens or lawns.

All owners or occupiers of land within the Narembeen Shire shall have firebreaks during the firebreak period of the dimensions prescribed within this notice.

If it is considered impractical or undesirable to provide firebreaks as required by this notice, the approval of the Council must be obtained for any variation. Approval will only be granted up to or before the 15th day of October and will not be granted unless prior consent of the appropriate Fire Brigade Officer has been obtained.

### Fire Breaks

### Rural Land:

Firebreaks 2.5 metres wide as follows:

· Immediately adjacent to and surrounding all cleared land subdividing all cleared land into areas no greater than 400 hectares. Surrounding each building, haystack, fuel dump or ramp.

### Townsite Land:

- Where the area of land is 2,000sqm or less clear all inflammable material on the land from the whole of the land.
- Where the area of land is more than 2,000sqm:
  - a) Clear all inflammable material on the land from the whole of the land or
  - b) Install a firebreak of not less than 2.0 metres in width immediately surrounding any building, along and within two metres of the external boundaries of the land is required. Firebreaks must be constructed and contained within the property. Footpaths, road verges, and roads will not be accepted as fire breaks.
- Fuel pumps and depots: remove all inflammable material from all land where fuel drum ramps or dumps are located and where fuel drums, whether containing fuel or not, are stored to a distance of at least fifteen (15) metres outside the perimeter of any drum, ramp, or stack of drums.

In addition to the requirements of this Notice, you may be required to carry out further works which are considered necessary by an Authorised Officer and specified by way of a separate written notice forwarded to the address of the owner/s as shown on the Shire of Narembeen rates record for the relevant land.

TAKE NOTICE that pursuant to Section 33(4) of the Bush Fires Act 1954, where the owner and/or occupier of land fails or neglects to comply with the requisitions of this Notice within the times specified, the Shire of Narembeen may by its officers and with such servants, workmen and contractors, vehicles and machinery as the officers deem fit, enter upon the land and carry out the requisitions of this Notice which have not been complied with and pursuant to Section 33(5) of the Bush Fires Act, the amount of any costs and expenses incurred may be recovered from you as the owner and or occupier of the land.

If the requirements of this Notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bush Fires Act 1954.

The PENALTY FOR FAILING TO COMPLY with this Notice is a fine not exceeding \$5000 and a person in default is also liable whether prosecuted or not to pay the costs of performing the work directed by this Notice if it is not carried out by the owner and/or occupier by the date required by this Notice.

### Additional Bushfire Information

### A. Restricted / Prohibited Burning Period

The following restricted and prohibited burning times are in place for the Shire of Narembeen.

- Restricted (Permit Required) 19th September to 31st October.
- Prohibited 1st November to 31st January.
- Restricted (Permit Required) 1st February to 15th March.

The following additional requirements for burning are also in place.

- 1st February includes grass and raked cereal stubble and header windrows of noncereal stubble including canola and legumes.
- · 1st March is header windrows and chaff dumps and cereal stubble fires.

Burning during restricted periods is allowed on Sunday's and Public Holidays with a permit.

Any questions about burning times should be directed to a Fire Control Officer or the Shire Office.

### B. Harvest & Movement Bans

When Harvest Bans are instigated, they are broadcast over Radiowest and ABC radio. A harvest ban can be in two forms:

- A Restricted Movement Ban means that vehicles are only allowed to move on paddocks to water stock.
- . A Total Movement Ban means that there is to be no movement on paddocks at all.

The Shire of Narembeen imposes an automatic Harvest Ban and Restriction of Movement of Machinery on Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

Harvest bans are gauged not only on the temperature, but also on humidity and wind velocity and are monitored using scientific methods.

Community members may call the Shire's Harvest Ban Hotline on (08) 9064 7689 which will provide advice on whether or not a harvest ban is in force.

The dedicated Bush Fire Emergency Communication Radio Channel is 5.

## E. Key Dates & Information to Remember for Burning Grass Burning

- · Grass Burning is not permitted prior to 1st February.
- · Grass Burning is subject to Permit Conditions
- No time restrictions for lighting/burning.
- · Burning permitted on Sunday's or Public Holiday's under permit.

### Raked Windrows

Burning of stubble raked windrows is permitted at the commencement of the Restricted Burning Period:

- Providing there are no time restrictions for lighting/burning.
- Subject to normal permit conditions

### Cereal Header Windrows & Chaff Dumps

- Burning of Cereal Header Windrows & Chaff Dumps is not permitted prior to 1st March.
- A permit is required to burn between 1<sup>st</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> March.
- Chaff Dumps shall be deposited/located no less than 50 metres from the edge of the crop within your property boundary.
- · Chaff Dumps be pushed out to reduce burning times.
- Consideration should be given to neighbours regarding wind and smoke directions.

### Non-Cereal Header Windrows

- Burning of Non-Cereal Header Windrows and Chaff Dumps is not permitted prior to 1st February.
- Burning of grass and raked cereal stubble and header windrows of non-cereal stubble including canola and legumes is not permitted prior to 1<sup>st</sup> February.
- A permit is required to burn between 1<sup>st</sup> February and 15<sup>th</sup> March.
- Chaff Dumps shall be deposited/located no less than 50 metres from the edge of the crop within your property boundary.
- Chaff Dumps be pushed out to reduce burning times.
- Consideration should be given to neighbours regarding wind and smoke directions.

### Stubble Burning

- Burning of Stubble is not permitted prior to 1st March in normal season conditions.
- No lighting times.
- Weather permitting.
- Subject to permit conditions.


